Fuel Management

Our Operations

In 2019 alone, AIRD Liberia compassionately transported and assisted 1,876 refugees, while managing a fleet of 8 trucks and 33 light vehicles that facilitated the movement of not only Persons of Concern but also AIRD staff and other implementing partners. Fuel Management is a key function that keeps these vehicles and assets going. **346,772** litres of diesel were issued and consumed within the year at 6 fuel stations. Transporting basic Non Food Items (NFIs) to displaced people enables them to restart their lives. AIRD Liberia transported **1,809** tons of NFIs in 2019. Storage of these items is possible at 4 warehouses with a capacity of **39,000** m3 in different locations across the country.

AIRD Liberia particularly excels in the implementation of livelihood and self-reliance programs. These are accomplished through:

- Provision of vocational training and capacity building
- Provision of support to Cash Based Initiatives (CBI) to support Income Generating Activities (IGAs)
- Supporting beneficiaries in development business plans
- Monitoring and mentoring beneficiaries in livelihoods projects

AIRD Liberia graduated **133** refugees who in 2019 attended 5 months' vocational skills training in soap making, tailoring, pastry making, tie and dye, hair dressing and interior decoration. **604** households benefitted from CBI support under the IGAs project. Targeted households support through technical agriculture activities was also achieved and **498** beneficiaries received chicken through one project.

In line with the overall goal of the organisation to do more for Persons of Concern, AIRD Liberia intends to further explore sustainable livelihood, WASH and environmental sustainability initiatives to promote resilience and empowerment for displaced people and their host communities.










Where we work



At the end of 2019, UNHCR reported **8,200** people of concern (98.8% Ivorian refugees, 1% refugees of various nationalities, and 0.2% asylum-seekers) in Liberia. Most of those displaced are hosted in 3 settlements located at Little Wlebo in Maryland County, PTP in Grand Gedeh County and Bahn in Nimba County. AIRD Liberia was there to facilitate and support many of these refugees and give them hope for a better future.

We want to do even more...

By delivering excellent humanitarian logistics, construction and infrastructure support to donors, agencies and governments.

As conditions in camps and settlements stabilise, including to the point of return for some refugees, AIRD will become increasingly connected to the host communities, IDPs & refugees, through the provision of sustainable livelihoods, WASH and environmental assistance to build their resilience, and to help those not in their usual place of abode to return home well and equipped to enhance their own communities.

AIRD also will proactively seek to **grow operational programmes** by considering supporting work in countries neighbouring existing field activity sites as well as those further afield.

Business development will be considered to evaluate the merits of establishing AIRD's logistics, vehicle maintenance etc as a business.
