Fuel Management

Our Operations

AIRD Tanzania was there to support and compassionately transport many of those displaced to safety, while providing goods and services to further build hope and resilience as they come to terms with having been forced to flee their homes.

The needs for safe accommodation for displaced people is great. In 2019 alone, AIRD Tanzania built **279** emergency shelters, constructed and distributed **1,918** and **997** transitional shelters respectively, and **1,000** upgradeable shelters gave many displaced families a place to call home. Transporting basic Non Food Items (NFIs) further enables displaced people to restart their lives. **55,389** tons of NFIs were transported by the team in 2019. Storage of these items is possible at 2 warehouses and 19 rub halls with a capacity of **12,000** m3 in different locations in the country. Trucking of **637,000** litres of water also helped to narrow a large gap experienced in camps.

Fuel Management is a critical function that keeps the vehicles and assets going that serve partners and AIRD staff in the various camps and settlements. **1,810,850** litres of diesel were issued and consumed for these purposes within the year at 2 fuel stations. With 2 workshops and **1,723** job cards completed in 2019, the team was also able to support the continued running of vehicles and assets in even the most remote areas served by various implementing partners.

In line with the overall goal of the organisation to do more for Persons of Concern, AIRD Tanzania intends to explore sustainable livelihoods, WASH and environmental sustainability initiatives to promote resilience and empowerment for displaced people and their host communities.










Where we work



At the end of 2019, UNHCR reported that Tanzania was host to **271,700** refugees and asylum-seekers mainly from Burundi and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). These numbers represent individuals forcefully displaced and looking for safety and hope for a future.

We want to do even more...

By delivering excellent humanitarian logistics, construction and infrastructure support to donors, agencies and governments.

As conditions in camps and settlements stabilise, including to the point of return for some refugees, AIRD will become increasingly connected to the host communities, IDPs & refugees, through the provision of sustainable livelihoods, WASH and environmental assistance to build their resilience, and to help those not in their usual place of abode to return home well and equipped to enhance their own communities.

AIRD also will proactively seek to **grow operational programmes** by considering supporting work in countries neighbouring existing field activity sites as well as those further afield.

Business development will be considered to evaluate the merits of establishing AIRD's logistics, vehicle maintenance etc as a business.
